Amazing seahorse discovery in Sark; a real Jonah and the whale story

Imagine the look of surprise on the face of fisherman Peter Guille of Sark when he pulled up a Pollack on the end of his line with a seahorse in its mouth. He removed the seahorse and put it back into the sea but when he gutted the less fortunate Pollack he found that its stomach was full of young seahorses and a few of them were still alive. After putting them in a bucket of seawater he headed back to harbour and got on the phone wildlife camerawoman Sue Daly (Sue is an old friend of the trust and our coordinator for the Channel Islands.) Sue met Peter at the harbour and after taking lots of pictures of his amazing find; she donned her SCUBA gear and dropped into the sea to release the 4 seahorses that had survived. Thanks to Peter and Sue for their quick thinking, they saved 5 seahorses from certain death.

Seahorses disappear from South Beach at Studland Bay in Dorset

In 2008 we recorded 40 individual seahorses on our study site at South Beach in Studland Bay, Dorset; in 2014 we have had one. Our research has shown the rapid decline in seahorses on the site due to habitat decline and so the need for an MCZ more urgent than before!!

Although an underwater photographer found a seahorse on the site next to ours which was a juvenile male who was probably transient through the site, this is disastrous news for what was one of the most important sites for Spiny Seahorses in the UK.

Please lobby DEFRA to get this site protected; it is more urgent than ever before



Spiny seahorses are one of two species of seahorse found in European waters; the other being the Short Snouted Seahorse.

The Spiny seahorses are very distinct; as their name suggest they have a mane of spines on the top of the head, running down the back and are usually Olivey green in colour. However like all seahorses they can change to all sorts of colours from white to yellow.#

They are a large seahorse measuring up to 18 cm from the top of the head to the end of the tail.

Conservation evening at Weymouth Sealife Centre

For the second year in a row we attended the Conservation evening at the Weymouth Sealife Centre, which like last year was well attended but unlike last year it was a very warm evening (it poured last year)

There were stands by a number of environmental charities and visitors to the evening enjoyed all the music and games that the staff and volunteers put on.

Sealife have been fantastic supporters of the trust for many years and we work in collaboration on captive breeding for conservation projects, surveying for seahorses in the wild and promoting the conservation of seahorses and the marine environment.



SEAHORSE FACT: There are approximately 42 to 65 species of seahorse around the world but nobody really knows for sure; our friends at Project Seahorse are trying to find out by using DNA analysis.

Seahorse surveying in Spain

As part of our European wide partnership we are gathering data on the two species found throughout Europe so we can better understand them and their needs. The Seahorse Trust works in partnership with many organisations through the Seahorse Alliance it set up and Kenna Eco Divers in L'Escala; South East Spain is one of those who we work closely with.

Between us we have identified 28 individual Seahorses and refound them on many occasions, which is helping to build a picture of their movements and behaviour. Each seahorse is given a unique name and they have become very well known to Gaynor and her teams of volunteers who go out daily to monitor them. They then send the data back to the trust and we update the database and analyse the information.

The trust is working with many countries in Europe including Malta, Spain, France, UK, Italy and it has been very revealing about how seahorses behave throughout their overall geographic region.

- Now that Studland Bay has become a proposed marine Conservation Zone it is imperative that we keep pressure on making this precious devastated site full protected; only by getting legal protection can we try to ensure that seahorses return to the site.
- The Seahorse Trust appeared on the letters page of October's BBC Wildlife magazine raising the issue of flash photography and seahorses after a picture appeared in the September issue that clearly showed a highly stressed seahorse that would have most likely died after the picture had been taken. We have campaigned long and hard to protect seahorses in the wild and it is now necessary to have a license if you intend to look for or photograph seahorses in the wild.

SEAHORSE FACT: The largest Spiny Seahorse (*Hippocampus guttulatus*) native of the United Kingdom and Europe was found in Poole Harbour, Dorset and measured 30 cm's from the top of the head to the end of the tail.
